Door on a stone home built by Joseph Button, a shoe cobbler and harness maker circa 1840's



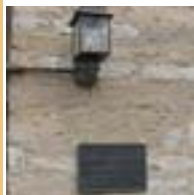
George Michael Karrer barn, built in 1857



Black Horse Tavern built in 1842 by Eliud Sells. This was the third "Black Horse Tavern" in Dublin



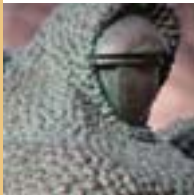
Dublin's first fire house, built in 1844.

Stone hitching post inscribed with the date "July 13, 1886"



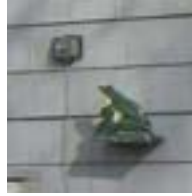
Granite fence at the former home of Dr. Henry and Bertha Karrer. The home was built in 1928-1929
